elcome to another circus-sized examination of the year in New Jersey politics, one that was as long on laughs and thuds as it was short on intellect and inspiration.

This was the year when Gov. Chris Christie, long accustomed to bulldozing people, got run over by Donald J. Trump.

It seemed harmless enough at first.
As Christie ran for president and Senate
President Steve Sweeney pursued the office of

governor, New Jersey kept a political holding pattern for the most part that at least didn't hasten doom. But when the two New Jersey leaders finally did get back to the business of governing, they approved a 23 cent on the gallon gax tax hike, which will add about \$200 annually to most residents' budgets.

No matter. At least we will have a competitive gubernatorial contest next year.

Oh, wait. That's already been decided.

he guy who grew up middle class on a good day proved he wasn't simply watching the *Andy Griffith Show* and *Hullabaloo* and daily strenuously resisting Henry James stereotypes up there in Boston in the 1960s. By the time Murphy was finished with this year's pre-Democratic Primary field, the retired Goldman Sachs executive and former U.S. Ambassador to Germany had unleashed a fearsome, Pamplona-like stampede of the town square. Jersey City Mayor Steven Fulop? Roadkill. Senate President Steve Sweeney? Flattened. Veteran Senator Ray Lesniak? Already outside Pamplona City limits on a flight to Paris. Only Assemblyman John Wisniewski was left to dangle hopelessly from spindly arms over the carnage.

Of course, political junkies hated Murphy's early resolution of the contest. Post-Chris Christie, we craved a real collision among Democratic Party heavyweights, and Fulop v. Sweeney represented an especially interesting rivalry, with enough civil war potential to make the pre-Franco era of Spain look like a warm-up act for New Jersey 2017. Murphy shut that down, launching his campaign for governor back in May (to jeers at the time), and relying on a combination of a veteran team of operatives to put together a great conventional battle plan. The Murphy Campaign simultaneously undertook a rigorous public schedule, meeting representatives of key political groups, most significantly in Bergen, Essex and Passaic counties; blanketed the air and web waves with biographical ads; and did sufficient homework on the opposition to gain a vital political edge.

Critically, Murphy himself proved an ebullient retail politician. While Sweeney and Fulop respectively lumbered and roadrunnered around the campaign trail, Murphy ubiquitously backslapped and bear-hugged with aplomb. He was likeable. So was his wife Tammy. After his Goldman Sachs colleague Jon Corzine radiated lack of warmth and a particular reliance on cash to offset a personality deficit, Murphy exceeded expectations as a slimmed-down and faster moving Tip O'Neill on the trail. Somone once said that FDR in a room had the quality of a bottle of just-uncorked champagne. That was Murphy in campaign mode. His critics seethed, irritated by the candidate's willingness to say just about anything to force-feed his message of progressive activism. Murphy's soundbites had to be particularly bothersome to Sweeney, who had staked his own political career on advancing marriage equality in the Garden State.

But Murphy proved effective, as he put together the perfect working combination of winsome grinning



public player and very sharp elbowed backroom team tactician to muscle his way to Democratic Party domination. What seemed to stick as New Jersey tried to get around the Christie/George Washington Bridge scandal era was the candidate's happy warrior persona. "I think the party's relieved that the guy we're putting up as our candidate for governor is a gentleman," veteran Democratic Committeeman Tom Barrett told PolitickerNJ on the same morning that Essex County Democratic chairman Leroy Jones led his county's delegation in endorsing Murphy.

Winner of the Year **Josh Gottheimer**



ook at the history of the 5th District. A Democrat's not supposed to win there, which was why Republican incumbent U.S. Rep. Scott Garrett tormented his liberal critics by running to the right with impunity for 12 years. Gottheimer ended the streak on November 8th, 2016 when the voters told Garrett to clear out his desk and go back to Wantage.

Gottheimer did several things very well. First, he raised the money (\$4 million plus to his opponent's \$2 million), second he exploited the incumbent's weaknesses to keep Garrett's legs tangled throughout the campaign, and third, he ran on a center-left message with the intent of looking like an adult alongside an irrepressibly dangerously goofy Garrett. Gottheimer also enjoyed the benefit of another solid performance by the Bergen County Democratic Committee led by perennially warpaint-wearing impressario Lou Stellato.

Gottheimer smartly stayed on offense against the man he branded "New Jersey's resident fanatic," not only highlighting the Republican's homophobia but making the hard dollars and cents case for why Garrett's ideological resistance to government forces local officials to rely on painful tax hiking measures to pay for vital resources like fire trucks. For years, Garrett had been skating on his image as a Clint Eastwood-like gunslinger from the hills of Sussex. Gottheimer turned that into a case for why the

incumbent was actually a shiftless, listless cowpoke with his hat pulled over his eyes, preposterously unwilling to see any benefit of government partnerships. Garrett had already left some voters scratching their heads over his refusal to accept federal Hurricane Sandy funds. Gottheimer kept on that theme when he made the case for Garrett's dereliction of duty for resisting a bill that would extend healthcare benefits for 911 first responders. Garrett countered with the argument that like everything else in Babylon, federal corruption sinks even the best intended bills.

But it finally didn't resonate.

It may not have helped Garrett either with his base when, with the polls showing him and the Democrat neck and neck, his legs buckled and he said he did not stand with Donald J. Trump's statements and that Mike Pence would have been a better nominee.

That late October event in Hackensack where Gottheimer and the Democrats brought in Gutzon Borglum model U.S. Rep. John Lewis (D-Ga.) gave the campaign a high finish of conquest, and it was an atmosphere that proved prophetic when Gottheimer polished off Garrett, 50 percent to 47 percent. It will likely be hard for the Democrat to hold on in this Republican-leaning district, but his showing against Garrett proved he will, at the very least, be a very tough out.

deserves it. Almost. But Christie - long the master of finding windows to dive through just in time to stay alive politically - finally fell apart here with sustained dreadful polling numbers that put him in the freefall category, very likely for the duration.

In the fall, Christie posted a 19 percent approval rating, according to Rutgers-Eagleton, and he looked just about bottomed out. Then in December, Fairleigh Dickinson polled him at 18 percent.

The designation found the governor in full-time scramble mode as he tried to evacuate New Jersey for the Trump administration. Christie figured he deserved the courtesy of a Hanoi helicopter rope ladder, for following the death of his own pres-

idential bid like a moose in the snows of New Hampshire, he became one of the first members of the GOP establishment to back the billionaire real estate tycoon. Trump made Christie chief of his transition team, but when it counted, Trump dumped him, then didn't want him, repeatedly passing over the toughtalking Livingstonian as he harvested other brand names for his cabinet. Propelled by Bridgegate Trial headlines that made Christie - at best - look abusive and cruel (he allegedly threw a water bottle at Bridget Kelly and crudely cursed at her, according to her trial testimony), and at worst cocooned him in the lane closures conspiracy and suggested the possibility of more investigations to come, the diss compounded those moments during the Republican Primary when Trump appeared to disrespect and humiliate Christie.

That worst moment came when Christie stood ritualistically onstage behind Trump like some fixture in a pagan temple that might as well have been cast in imitation bronze.



ou can laugh about it, and say he's going nowhere fast playing Hector to Murphy's Achilles. But most lawmakers fitted for the guillotine in this state simply disappear when the organization wants to get rid of them. They lack the political creativity, follow-through, chutzpah, and warrior street cred to go out on their shields like Boromir. Or like Wiz. emo to Gill's Atlantic City rat pack entourage. It's time for a Wikipedia biographical page for the boss from Montclair. Let's face it. Steven Fulop made his biggest early strategic mistake as a gubernatorial candidate when he opted not to hire Gill. Not only did the Essex County Freeholder - and Errol Flynn-lookalike - offer a sparkling record as a big picture operations guy, the resume included valuable toe-to-toe time with South Jersey in the 2008 Democratic Primary when Gill ran Frank Lautenberg's successful campaign against Haddon Heights Congressman Rob Andrews. In addition to having served as Senator Lautenberg's New Jersey director, Gill presented a diversified statewide skillset, with Cory Booker-handling part of his campaigns and elections portfolio. Then there was the fact that he was an elected official in the most Democratic Party registered voter-rich county in the state, with a history of balancing friendly relations between the fiercely warring factions of DiVincenzo and Codey. Arguably the low-drama, down-to-business Gill's biggest hangup - like every former Irish Catholic altar boy - is he gets squeamish about self-promotion. The popular Republican mayor of Elmwood Park served as the Bergen town's top elected official for 45 years. He was 80.

Mayor Lizette Parker

The mayor of Teaneck died in April at the age of 44. The Democratic had a reputation locally as "the consummate professional," according to The Bergen Record. She was the first black woman to serve as mayor of a Bergen municipality.

Al Koeppe

The chief executive officer of the Newark Alliance and former

president and chief operating officer of both Public Service Electric and Gas Company and Verizon died earlier this month at the age of 70.

Mercer County Democratic Chairman Richard McClellan

The longtime Democratic Party insider and friend to political reporters died in October at the age of 61.

Barbara McConnell

The Democratic Assemblywoman served in the Legislature in the late 1970s



and early 1980s, and later in the cabinet of Governor Jim Florio. She was 80.

Bill Gaughan

The former Jersey City Councilman was a beloved figure locally; an all-around wonderful guy whose presence at a Hudson County political event signified its authenticity. He was 78.

Bill Perkins

The former Jersey City Assemblyman died in February at the age of 76. He left behind a strong legacy as a high school sports star, attorney and Democratic Party politician.

The former Democratic mayor of Barnegat died in November at the age of 75.

Jaime Vazquez

The former Jersey City councilman died in October at the age of 67. The Jersey Journal cited him as "a longtime voice for the city's Latino and veterans communities."

The Metuchen councilman died in November at the age of 75. He was a former fire chief and a retired Metuchen police sergeant, and the Middlesex town's former Office of Emergency Management director.

Hackensack's first African-American councilman died in October at the age of 87. Mr. Leverett was a mechanical engineer and veteran of the Korean war.

his daughter.

Jon Erickson

The Highland Park councilman was 67 years old when he succumbed to lung cancer.

Paul Elia

The Cliffside Park councilman was the patriarch of a prominent football family, according to his August obituary in The Bergen Record. He was 89.

Gloria Kolodziej

The former mayor and longtime councilwoman of Clifton died in December at age 77. "Mom dedicated her life to fighting for the greater good and for people who needed a helping hand," her son, Joseph, a Clifton councilman, said in a statement to the Record.

Francis Hunter

The former Ramapo Councilwoman, a retired school principal "known for promoting diversity," died in August. She was 84.

Victor B. Villalta

The Democrat who served Harrison as Second Ward councilman, died in May at the age of 67. a native of Peru, he was a Marine Corps veteran of Vietnam who earned the Bronze Star and Purple Heart combat medals.

Leonard Connors

The beloved Republican from Ocean County served in the state senate from 1982 to 2008. He was 87.
